

Exeat

There are two types of exeats: general and medical.

All students will be allowed two exeats each mid-semester. Please plan accordingly to avoid disapointments.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceeding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approval exeat from their phone to enter (NO SHOW. NO GOI)

Students must return by 5.00pm on Sundays (weekend exeats).



General Exeat

A general exeat will cover passport and visa matters, as well as family events. These must not exceed more than two per mid-semester.

Medical Exeat

A medical exeat will cover medical, dental, optical, and hospital appointments. When possible, appointments should be made for Saturdays, to minimise learning loss.

A medical exeat is for the same day departure and return. Otherwise, it is a general exeat. Requesting a medical exeat with a departure on Friday and a return on Sunday is a weekend (general) exeat.
























The team used the occasion as an opportunity to conduct interviews to seek the views of a section of attendees.

Mr Dennis (TIS Dance and Drama facilitator), how did you prepare for the unit celebration, and what challenges did you face?

Mr Dennis: Preparation for the exhibition involved intensive collaboration with the celebration team. Teachers had to collaborate with their students to design activities aligned with their unit and connect them to the SDGs. Initially, involving the Grade 6 class due to their exhibition prep was challenging. Getting them away from their stations to rehearse was difficult, but through perseverance, we successfully integrated their contributions, ensuring a cohesive and engaging event.

Mr Annan, please share your reflections on the unit celebration and exhibition. What did you observe? We would appreciate any impressions, areas of improvement, and constructive feedback.

Mr Annan: As a parent, witnessing our children engage in their initiatives has been incredibly rewarding. They are given the space to contribute meaningfully to their communities, selecting project areas with global impact tailored to our local context here in Ghana. It's inspiring to see them grasp complex concepts and apply them practically, unlike our own experiences in school. The collaborative efforts of students, teachers, and management are evident in the quality of their work. Mentoring from older students, like last year's partnership between grades 5 and 6, adds valuable exposure. The commitment from the school management, evident in their resource allocation, further enhances this learning environment. Overall, it's been a very fulfilling experience, and I commend everyone involved for their dedication.

How about your reflections on the student-led conferences? You have a ward in the Early Years and two in Primary.

I've only sometimes been here early enough to participate in all of them because the kids are three, so sometimes depending on the time I get here, I'm able to do it for just a child or two. Nonetheless, I've eventually made it a point to attend each event for all my children. I think most of the things I see are expected for the older kids, but the last one I did for Lucille in the early years was great. That was the first time I fell in love with it, and I was like, how the teacher managed to draw the lessons out of her; it looked like she understood everything taught in class. I've never been worried about what they are learning anymore and always mentioned that the teacher was very good.

Hello Mrs Amoo, how did you feel about the whole presentation? What did you love about them, and what do you think we can do as a school to improve it?

Mrs Amoo: Reflecting on my five years with TIS, I've been consistently impressed by the growth and innovation evident in each unit celebration and exhibition. This year's exhibition, focused on the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), was particularly enlightening. It's commendable that the students are engaging with such critical global issues, especially considering that many adults are unfamiliar with the SDGs. The stands on gender equality and life under the ocean stood out for their colourful presentation and insightful content. Teaching gender equality from an early age is crucial, given our societal context. Every stand showcased impressive work, demonstrating the dedication of both students and mentors. I'm continually amazed by the school's commitment to introducing new concepts and ideas. Thank you, TIS, for fostering such a stimulating learning environment.

Would you like to suggest some things we can also work on to make our celebrations better and bigger?

I know TIS's online channel, where many of our unique celebrations and activities are showcased. This platform effectively communicates the school's ethos to the world. It's reassuring to know that TIS emphasises practical learning over rote memorisation. While an outdoor celebration might have its charms, I appreciate the logistical considerations that go into planning events indoors. TIS consistently demonstrates foresight in mitigating potential disruptions. Thank you, TIS, for your dedication and may you continue to thrive.

Lisa-Marie Ocansey (TIS Intern): I want to thank everyone involved - the teachers, students, and all contributors. I understand the challenges faced during rehearsals, learning lines, and mastering new choreography alongside regular studies. Donation to the Senior Correctional Centre by BWB local action project team.



On 1 May 2024, we visited the **Senior Correctional Centre** to deliver our donations. Though initially apprehensive about interacting with the juveniles, our perception changed upon witnessing their helpful demeanour towards the officers and their hopeful gazes, symbolised by their orange uniforms representing confinement.

Our objective extended beyond a mere donation; we aimed to motivate and support the 26 upcoming BECE candidates. We were deeply moved when welcomed into their classroom by warm smiles and a touching anthem with lyrics like "For we know we have sinned" and "We shall rise again to return to society." An officer enlightened us about the juveniles' situation, emphasising the importance of protecting their identities due to their status as first-time offenders with potential correction and future success.

Engaging with the students, we discovered their aspirations. Otabil dreams of becoming a musician, while others aspire to be doctors and lawyers. Their determination to seize opportunities for a better future was palpable. We imparted motivational words, stressing the significance of education, and addressed their inquiries, including heartfelt ones like "What do people outside think about us?" Reassuring them of our support, we encouraged diligent study and transformation.

Joining the Buddies for Change club was my first step towards positively impacting my community. I wanted to give back uniquely, and although it was challenging, the experience was incredibly rewarding.

Our initial meeting could have more organised, with members arriving late and debating which SDG goal to focus on. However, we quickly learned to listen to understand each other better. We decided to support boys at the local correction centre, providing them with learning materials, snacks, and sanitary supplies. These individuals are often overlooked due to their offences. and we wanted to show them they matter.

We held a pancake sale to fund this project, raising 9,000 GHC. With additional donations from our families and friends, we reached our goal of 10,000 GHC. On 1 May, we visited the Senior Correction Centre for Boys in Ridge, where

we donated the items, talked with the boys about their dreams, and encouraged them as they prepared for their BECE exams.

One boy's question, "What do people think about us?" deeply resonated with me, highlighting how easily life can take unexpected turns. We also learned that since they are first-time offenders, they won't have a criminal record, so we couldn't take pictures with them. Touring the facility, we discovered their minimal meals made me appreciate the little things I often take for granted.

From the outset, the path was a rollercoaster. Our first pancake sale taught us invaluable lessons in coordination, teamwork, and communication, which proved indispensable as we navigated the challenges ahead. One skill showcased during the pancake sales was collaboration.

Working in the kitchen with individuals who had different techniques was challenging, but we set aside our differences to achieve our goal. Spending our three-hour free periods preparing for the sale and enjoying the success afterwards was a memorable experience. I learned self-management and prioritisation skills and balancing schoolwork and the project.

My thoughts about them changed at the end of our trip to the Senior Correctional Centre for boys. I didn't see them as bad individuals but as ones who were negatively influenced or caught in unfortunate circumstances. Even though we weren't able to know their crimes but a summary of them being rape, defilement, murder, and robbery was quite scary, especially as it was done by 13-17-year-olds. Despite this, some of the boys there showed remorse for their actions and indeed have broad ambitions, ranging from a doctor to a musician to an actor. Despite their actions, they had big dreams. I also realised how fortunate we are, seeing as their only source of protein is beans, and they rarely eat bread, chicken, meat, or fish. Visiting the centre reshaped my perception of them, and I hope further projects are done there. **Alswell Adelaide Egbenya**, **G11**

Our CAS project trip to the correctional centre near the Town Palace Hotel in Accra was a moving experience. I was excited about it, even though we knew it would be a long journey. But we made it with some luck and maybe some divine intervention!

When we finally arrived, it was overwhelming at first. Seeing the students in their uniforms and knowing the restrictions they faced, I realised this would be a different school visit. But as I started talking to them, it felt more and more like we were hanging out with classmates.

We brought supplies like stationery and drinks, which might not seem like a big deal to us, but it meant the world for them. It was a reminder of how the little things can make a big difference.

The highlight of the day was chatting with the students in the classroom. We talked about staying motivated and not giving up, even when things get tough. It was pretty emotional, especially when one student asked how people outside view them. That was a tough answer, but I tried to be honest while reminding them everyone deserves a second chance.



The real tear-jerker was when the students shared their anthem with us. The lyrics were about rising up after falling, and it hit me right in the feels. It made me realise that we all make mistakes, but what we do next counts.

Looking back, I'm so grateful for the opportunity to connect with these students and hopefully make a difference, even if it's just a small one. It's a reminder that we're all in this together, and a little kindness can go a long way. **Kelvin Ansong, G11**

Following a lengthy discussion, we settled on SDG 4, Quality Education, for our Local Action Project. We believed that as students of Tema International School, we could make a meaningful difference in the lives of less privileged students by sharing our educational advantages. The Senior Correctional Centre, a juvenile facility for teens who have committed offences, caught my attention as a potential beneficiary. Our objective was to donate educational supplies and emphasise the importance of education, especially for those preparing for their BECE exams.

Thanks to everyone's support, especially our parents and our pancake sales, we raised 10,000 GHC and promptly ordered the necessary supplies. We donated on May 1st, 2024, filled with anticipation and nervousness. We grappled with societal perceptions of those labelled as "criminals."

Upon arriving at the Senior Correctional Centre, we were met with warmth. Young individuals in orange, symbolising their confinement, helped us distribute supplies with smiles. The sight of the classrooms, with old wooden desks, filled me with nostalgia and excitement.

Engaging with them, we discovered their aspirations and dreams—future musicians, doctors, lawyers, and more. Their enthusiasm was palpable. We also answered their questions by offering encouragement, especially for their upcoming BECE exams. One poignant question was, "What does society think of us?" It reminded me of the stigma they faced.

Despite their circumstances, they remained hopeful. We must not condone their past actions, but we mustn't demoralise them. Instead, we should empower and support them to become better individuals.






