



Main Campus Information



Exeats

Exeats for secondary school students cover passport and visa matters, family events, as well as medical, dental, optical and medical appointments.

Students are allowed a maximum of 8 days per semester. Note: A weekend exeat that commences on Friday and ends on Sunday counts as three days.

For a weekend exeat, students must return by 5.00pm on the Sunday.

All exeat requests must be completed online and submitted with at least 48 hours' notice, with the exception of urgent medical issues. Weekend exeat requests must be received by the preceding Wednesday. Any requests after this deadline will not be approved.

The integrity of an exeat request is critical.

No exeats will be granted if a student has outstanding work.

No exeats will be granted during the last week before a semester break.

Parents/Drivers must show the approved exeat from their phone to security to enter.

(NO SHOW. NO GO.)

Families should plan their exeat requests carefully to avoid any disappointment.

Admissions 2025/2026

Admissions for the next academic year are now open for the secondary school, Grades 7-12.

- Priority for TIS family members ended on 30 November 2024.
- The first round of admissions will be conducted in February.
- Prospective students are required to complete application forms online via https://tis.openapply.com
- An application fee can be paid into the school's account. The account details can be found on the Bank Details page.
- All prospective students will take an aptitude test that does not require special preparation. Before a final decision is made, an interview will be conducted. Parents will be informed of the outcome of the selection process.
- Only candidates who have fully completed the application form will be contacted for the aptitude test and subsequent interview.
- Prospective families must arrange a school tour before the admission test and interview.
- Early applications and admissions are encouraged. Late applications will be considered if vacancies exist.
- For grades 7, 8 and 9, applicants must provide three current term or two-semester reports.
- Applicants for Grade 11 will be required to provide three current term or two semester reports, predicted grades and a recommendation letter. When final results are released, applicants must attach a scanned copy on OpenApply. The release of final results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher).
- After completing the Middle Years Programme (Grade 10), TIS students are expected to complete the IB Diploma Programme in Grades 11 and 12. They will make initial subject selection choices during the second semester of Grade 10. The release of examination results will confirm subject selection levels (Standard or Higher). Please note that students are generally not accepted into (Grades 10 and 12).





Unlocking Potential Through Enrichment at TIS Primary School

At Tema International Primary School, learning extends beyond the classroom. We believe in holistic learning, where students are encouraged to explore their interests, develop new talents, refine essential life skills, and develop well-rounded students. This is where our well-programmed enrichment activities come into play; we engage in activities like *ballet*, *acrobatics*, *reading*, *music*, *art*, *robotics* and *coding*, *dance*, and *sports* to nurture creativity, discipline, confidence, and problem-solving skills in every student. The enrichment program follows a well-scheduled timetable that allows learners to engage in multiple activities to improve their skills, coordination, and learning.

ACROBATICS (GYMNASTICS)


Early Years and Primary School learners develop flexibility, strength, and coordination through acrobatics and ballet while nurturing discipline, balance, and self-expression.



Below are reflections from the acrobatics' instructor and students on the enrichment journey.

The early years learners are focusing on basic acrobatic exercises to develop strength, flexibility, balance, and coordination. They are practicing movements such as tabletop, bridge, superhero, handstand, and cartwheel. Each activity builds on their skills, preparing them for more advanced disciplines. Currently, they are working on the tuck jump.

The primary students aspire to achieve incredible things. However, I realize that our rehearsal time is limited, and they have varying abilities. I support them by spotting them in different activities and providing exercises suited to their individual skills. This time, we aim to combine acrobatics with dance.





The acrobatics activity is very nice and also very quiet because it requires focus. I have learned that it is about flexibility, strength, and focus. I enjoy doing the L-hand shape the most.

We have been doing cartwheels, superheroes, and handstands. I am always happy when I do them, and I enjoy doing the cartwheel.





The acrobatics activities have helped me to be active, and I like the cobra style and the L-hand shape.

Gymnastics helps me to be more flexible. We practice cartwheels, bridges, and splits. The fun part is that we are doing an Afro-dance, and it helps me express myself better.



BALLET

At TIS Primary School, we see ballet as a beautiful art form that helps our students develop grace, balance, and coordination to build their strength, discipline, and confidence.



Ballet through the eyes of the instructor and our wonderful students: *Reflections*.



For the early years, we are focusing on their social and emotional development to build their confidence and self-esteem as they perform in front of other people. The intention is to help the young learners build strength, improve flexibility at an early age, and tap in to their creativity. some of the learners enjoy doing the butterfly position.

In the Primary years, I primarily focus on helping students develop their motor skills and math concepts, particularly in patterns and counting. Ballet teaches rhythm, and we practice counting as they move from circles to straight lines, which helps improve their coordination.



We learn how to point our toes and sometimes it is challenging to get it right, but we practice more and also work on spinning. I like doing the fith position.

I feel elegant when I am dancing because you need grace to dance. I learnt that you should always ran like a princess during the ballet performance.





I love ballet because we spin, do the pays, and enjoy spinning the most.

ROBOTICS

TIS Primary School embraces technology by introducing robotics to enhance students' problem-solving, coding, innovation, and critical thinking skills in STEM education.














TIS Primary School builds the future. Robotics and Coding reflections from Instructors and Students.



We are learning about specialized engineering, which involves building robots. Our robotics and coding class has two groups: Innovation and Discovery. In the Discovery group, we do hands-on activities using LEGO and the VEX toolkit. Currently, we are exploring the life cycle of a frog using the VEX toolkit.

Students have been introduced to programming with the Micro:bit. They are learning how to turn a light on and off using sound, and they are being guided to program it using a specific sound frequency.




We learn different coding languages to program various things. We use Scratch, Micro:bit, and VEX to create real-life codes.

READING

Through engaging books and literacy activities, students develop a love for reading while strengthening their comprehension, communication skills, curiosity and a passion for learning at TIS Primary School.



Opening minds through reading: Reflections from both teachers and students.



Our reading sessions provide students with engaging opportunities to explore literacy in meaningful ways. Through Padlet, they reflect on their reading, share insights, and strengthen their comprehension skills. Spelling activities are done to improve their recognition of sounds and words. Additionally, they have access to online resources like Epic that allows them to choose educational books that spark their interest, fostering independence and a love for reading.



In our enrichment program, we empower students by engaging them in various activities that enhance their literacy skills. They develop their spelling, practice reading aloud, and improve their conversational abilities. Through interactive learning, they gain confidence and proficiency in communication.



The reading activities are enjoyable, and I have learned new words from the books I read. I have also improved my spelling of new words.

We learn new words, have reflection time, and practice phonics. We also engage in games, spell words, and I think it's fun. During reading, you need to focus more to understand it better.





I like the reading activities because everyone participated by reading and playing fun games. It has helped me to learn more words and improve my reading.

ART

Creativity flourishes at our Primary School campus, where learners express themselves through painting, drawing, and shading. This fosters their imagination and fine motor skills.



We unleash creativity at TIS Primary School: Reflections from the art teacher and students.



We engage students in creative activities, from painting to craftwork, which extends into their various Units of Inquiry. Through these activities, students explore their creativity, developing both motor skills and metacognition. It is a great experience that allows them to express themselves creatively.



We draw, color, and shade to create artworks. It has helped me to improve my drawing, shading, and coloring skills, as I fill in all areas without leaving white spaces.



The drawings we do are sometimes challenging, while others are easier for me. We also design peacocks from paper and create other craft projects individually.



We have been practicing realistic drawing using art pictures. Now, I have started drawing on my own, and I believe I am improving.

DANCE

Rhythm, melody, and movement come together as students explore different dance styles and appreciate art.

We have our dance enrichment program every Friday afternoon here in the Primary School, designed to prepare students for their class assemblies or unit celebrations while keeping the Unit of Inquiry in mind. Currently, the dance we are working on is connected to the storyline, bringing the unit celebration to life (Sankofa). This experience allows students to learn and appreciate their culture while developing their skills to perform traditional dances.

The History of International Women's Day

What is Women's Day?

International Women's Day (IWD) is a global event celebrating women's social, economic, cultural, and political achievements. It is also a call to action for gender equality. Around the world, people commemorate this day by honouring women's contributions and advocating for progress.

How Did International Women's Day Originate?

IWD has been observed since the early 1900s, a time of significant industrial and social change. The first National Women's Day (NWD) was celebrated in the United States on 28 February, following a declaration by the Socialist Party of America. Women continued to observe NWD on the last Sunday of February until 1913, when it evolved into the International Women's Day we recognise today.

Women Who Made International Women's Day Possible

One of the key figures behind International Women's Day was Clara Zetkin (1857–1933), a German feminist and socialist leader. As the head of the Women's Office of the Social Democratic Party in Germany, she proposed the idea of a global Women's Day—an annual event where women in every country would unite to press for their rights. Challenges Faced by Women Today



Women around the world continue to face significant challenges, including gender inequality, wage gaps, and violence. Although progress has been made, disparities still exist.

- In many workplaces, women are paid less than men for the same work. According to the UN, globally, women earn only 77% of what men earn for equal work.
- Women are more vulnerable to gender-based violence, including **human trafficking, sexual harassment, and domestic abuse**. In many cases, weak legal protections mean these crimes go unpunished.

However, organisations like **UN Women, the Malala Fund, and Vital Voices** are working tirelessly to address

these issues:

- UN Women's 'HeForShe' campaign encourages men to actively support gender equality.
- The Malala Fund fights for 12 years of free, quality education for girls in Asia and Africa
- **Vital Voices** supports female leaders, entrepreneurs, and activists advocating for social and economic change.

While progress has been made, true equality is still a long way off. We must continue advocating for change until women everywhere have the same rights, opportunities, and protections as men.

Celebrating Women's Achievements in STEM

Women have made groundbreaking contributions in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM), breaking barriers despite facing gender discrimination.

- Emily Warren Roebling led the construction of the Brooklyn Bridge.
- Mary Jackson became NASA's first Black female engineer.
- Ada Lovelace was the first computer programmer.
- Katherine Johnson calculated crucial trajectories for NASA's Apollo missions.



Today, women like **Dr. Fei-Fei Li**, who has been called the godmother of AI for her pioneering work in computer vision and image recognition. Li invented ImageNet, a foundational large-scale dataset that has contributed to key developments in deep learning and artificial intelligence, and Dr. Neri Oxman, an Israeli-American designer and former professor known for art that combines biology, computing, and materials design, engineering. She coined the phrase "material ecology" to define her work. These women continue to push the boundaries of innovation.

One of the most influential female scientists was **Marie Curie**. She was the first woman to win a Nobel Prize and the only person to win in two different scientific fields, physics and Chemistry. Her discoveries in radioactivity paved the way for advancements in medicine and nuclear energy.

Another unsung hero is **Rosalind Franklin**, whose X-ray diffraction images provided crucial evidence for scientists to model the structure of DNA. Her work set the foundation for modern genetics.

Women like these remind us that gender should never be a barrier to success. As we celebrate International Women's Day, we must continue supporting and amplifying women's voices in STEM.

The Academic Research & Writing Principles

Turnitin has developed this checklist as a guide to support students in their academic research and writing process. Use the 12 suggested guiding principles to help you to produce high quality research and original writing, from the pre-reading stage to final submission.

1

Explore

a wide range of research. Research the topic thoroughly to develop your knowledge base, discover new ideas and strengthen your own line of argument.

2

Evaluate

the reliability of your sources. Take some time to evaluate all your sources, particularly if information has been accessed online. Consider who has created the information and why.

3

Organise

your research notes.
Note taking is a fundamental part of the research process.
Keep notes neatly organised and retain a copy of each source used.

4

Write

an original paper.
The best defence against plagiarism is original writing. Unless quoting directly from someone else's work, express all ideas in your own words.

5

Paraphrase

other people's ideas.
An essential academic skill, some find it helpful to note down key words and concepts before paraphrasing other people's ideas.

6

Differentiate

other's work from your own original insights by referencing or paraphrasing. Avoid accidentally plagiarising someone else's work by using academic referencing. 7

Cite

all of your sources.
A citation in your paper shows exactly what information has come from another source. Remember to cite all borrowed words or ideas, including those which came from one of your own previous papers!

8

Reference

all of your citations correctly. Depending on the referencing system used, this may end in a list of sources as a 'bibliography'. Most students are aware of referencing requirements surrounding books and journals, but we must also reference sources like YouTube videos, images, diagrams and yourself!

9

Use

the relevant referencing system consistently throughout your assignment. Referencing can

vary across module units or each course so check which system you should use and follow the relevant formatting guidelines. 10

Ask

your teacher or instructor for their feedback on

any drafts you have written in advance of the deadline. Writing multiple drafts and implementing the feedback you receive can help to make you a better writer.

11

Double check

your work including citations. Allow time to double check each of your citations before submission. This includes page numbers, publication dates, web links and authors' names.



Submit your final piece through Turnitin

Turnitin will check your work against other sources in the Turnitin database and use this information to generate an originality report.
